WASHINGTON - Helen Thomas, the longest serving White House correspondent, retired Monday after comments she made about Israel drew condemnation from both the White House and the White House Correspondents Association.

Hearst News Service announced Thomas's retirement in a news story transmitted Monday morning. The story said her retirement was immediate.

"I deeply regret my comments I made last week regarding the Israelis and the Palestinians," the story quoted Thomas as saying. "They do not reflect my heart-felt belief that peace will come to the Middle East only when all parties recognize the need for mutual respect and tolerance. May that day come soon."

Thomas will mark her 90th birthday on Aug. 4.

White House press secretary Robert Gibbs said Monday that Thomas's comments, in which she said Jews should leave Israel and return to Europe, were reprehensible. The White House Correspondents Association called them indefensible.

The association's board also said it was reconsidering Thomas's special seat in the front row of the White House briefing room.

"I think those remarks were offensive and reprehensible," Gibbs said when asked about her comments at Monday's press briefing.

"I think she should and has apologized. Because,

obviously, those remarks ...do not reflect, certainly, the opinion of, I assume, most of the people in here and certainly not of the administration."

Thomas did not attend Monday morning's briefing, which featured Coast Guard Adm. Thad Allen, the administration's point man on the BP Deepwater Horizon oil spill.

Thomas was asked about Israel on May 27. The video was recorded by the website RabbiLive.com on the day the White House held a Jewish Heritage event. The video was released Friday.

"Any comments on Israel," an offscreen voice asks Thomas.

"Tell them to get the hell out of Palestine," Thomas says.

"Where should they go?" the offscreen voice asks.

She responds that they should go home to Germany, Poland or the United States.

After a special meeting Monday, the correspondents' association board issued a statement condemning Thomas's comments.

"Helen Thomas' comments were indefensible and the White House Correspondents Association board firmly dissociates itself from them," the group said.

"Many in our profession who have known Helen for years were saddened by the comments, which were especially unfortunate in light of her role as a trail blazer on the White House beat.

"While Helen has not been a member of the WHCA for many years, her special status in the briefing room

has helped solidify her as the dean of the White House press corps so we feel the need to speak out strongly on this matter.

"We want to emphasize that the role of the WHCA is to represent the White House press corps in its dealings with the White House on coverage-related issues. We do not police the speech of our members or colleagues. We are not involved at all in issuing White House credentials, that is the purview of the White House itself.

"But the incident does revive the issue of whether it is appropriate for an opinion columnist to have a front row seat in the WH briefing room. That is an issue under the jurisdiction of this board."

Amidst controversy, Helen Thomas resigns

It only took one minute to end Thomas' 57 year career

Four days ago a 63 second video clip was uploaded to YouTube. A quarter-million views later Helen Thomas 89, is out of a job.

The daughter of Lebanese immigrants, Thomas made an anti-Israeli remark at a Jewish heritage celebration at the White House. The videographer was a Rabbi and a blogger. It took almost two weeks to post the video and it was viral in a matter of days.

The issue here is how does a one minute video clip ruin 57 years of hard work? Well, it doesn't.

Thomas has covered every single president since John F. Kennedy was in office. In that time she has become a pillar in the White House press corp, reporting for UPI. She is the only reporter to have a chair designated specifically for her, as opposed to the news agency they represented.

After UPI went under she began writing a column for the Hearst publication giant. She became the only opinion columnist to have access to White House press conferences. This left Thomas open to ask any question she wanted. Known for pushing the boundaries and asking the uncomfortable questions, this led her to dangerous waters.

Thomas was rouge, she pushed the envelope and with the filters falling away in her old age it was only a matter a time before that habit got her in trouble. It is a good example that you are free to say

whatever you want as long as the general consensus agrees with the remarks.

There are plenty of reasons that led to her retirement and it may have well been past due, but is this really how we want to end the story on one of the greatest American journalist of all time.

The American sentiment is to support Israel and we have finically, political, and in many jewish communities, culturally. Barring her language there was nothing wrong with voicing the pro-Palestine viewpoint, the only problem was it was delivered caustically, and to a Rabbi blogger.



already, everyone's been waiting for the year's first great adult comedy. Some have been good, but none have been it. 'Get Him to the Greek' is that comedy.

The premise is easy, a young newcomer working in the music industry gets his big, unexpected break in the form of escorting a famous rock star from London to Los Angeles, with a stop-over in New York. Let the hilarity ensue. The story's not deep, but does provide a message of sorts by the end. The story follows a standard formula. Whatever that formula may be, it works here, thanks to likable characters that are perfectly cast, and hilarious entertaining.

Jonah Hill plays wide-eyed intern Aaron Greenberg, who's known for getting things done. Big-wig music producer played by Sean "Diddy" Combs tasks him with a monumental job. Both actors provide convincing performances, making it seem as if the roles were written specifically for them (they may have been in fact).

Korea bound to get kicked around

North Korea battles Brazil in the World Cups

In the World Cups group G, DPR Korea has taken on the role of the ultimate underdogs or to put it bluntly they haven't a bloody chance in hell. DPR Korea has been matched up with Brazil, not only the team with the most World Cup appearances; 18, but also the former World Cup champions.

The World Cup contains eight different groups made up of four countries each, which the 32 countries are randomly divided into. From each of the eight groups
